An open letter to the Foreign Affairs Council of the European Union (September 21, Brussels)

September 20, 2020

Dear ministers,

We welcome the effort of top European politicians to take part in solving the crisis in Belarus. We fully support the appeal of the European Council to stop the violence in the country and to start national dialogue about the nonrecognition of Alexander Lukashenko as the legitimate president. We also back the resolution of the European Parliament regarding the topic of sanctioning the leaders of the ruthless Belarusian regime.

The latest developments show that Belarusian leadership is ignoring these appeals from the European Union and as a matter of fact, rejects them. We can currently see intense violations of fundamental human rights and of Belarusian law by the state's institutions (police, courts, prosecution)

A particularly alarming fact is that Alexander Lukashenko who doesn't have a legitimate mandate and is now the illegitimate president of Belarus is starting talks with the Russian leadership instead of encouraging dialogue with his people. These backdoor meetings could threaten Belarusian sovereignty and only for the guarantee of rescuing and keeping Alexander Lukashenko safe. We similarly condone the Russian intervention in its neighbouring state without a proper international mandate to do so. This is, in essence, meddling in Belarusian internal affairs and it could potentially lead to a military or police intervention.

Considering that Belarus is a neighbour of the European Union just as of Russia, EU's participation in solving the Belarusian crisis should be to such an extent that the Belarusian citizens' fundamental human rights are being respected again. In the long term the European Union has been offering the countries of this region an opportunity to create a space of stability, economic prosperity and democracy thanks to the Eastern Partnership. The post-election state of the country, however, requires even more daily attention. We cannot leave the deaths of peaceful citizens and mass crimes against humanity without investigation.

We therefore appeal to the European Council to take the following steps:

- Introduce personal sanctions directed at persons that participated in the falsification of the elections or on the brutal repressions of the protests, including Alexander Lukashenko and his closest associates responsible for these unlawful acts. These sanctions should be regularly revised. If the unlawful action and violation of human rights continues these sanctions must be further increased or amended by adding other natural or legal persons.
- Use the tools and resources of OSCE a) for international mediation of political dialogue with all parts of the Belarusian society b) to investigate and punish the crimes against humanity, including the Moscow mechanism of OSCE

- Use all means of European diplomacy to stop Russian meddling in the internal matters of Belarus.
- Provide financial aid solely to the Belarus civic society and immediate suspension of EU aid to official Belarus state institutions.
- Recognize Sviatlana Tsikhanouskaya as the representative of Belarus who has the public and moral mandate to represent the Belarusian people, lead national dialogue and ensure a peaceful transfer of power in Belarus to the new and legitimate leaders who will be elected in free and fair elections.

To improve the situation it is necessary to use all the peace and lawful measures that are available to the European Union to the highest degree and thus prevent the impending, much more serious consequences on Europe and especially on the people of Belarus.
